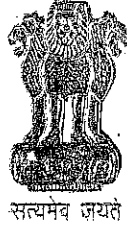

The various issues of recruitment, training, promotional prospects etc. of police personnel had been raised by Review Committee on police reforms headed by Shri R.S. Mooshahary. These recommendations were forwarded to the States/UTs for its implementation.

2. Recently, the Department-related Parliamentary Standing Committee (DPSC) on Home Affairs on the subject "Police-Training, Modernisation and Reforms" in its 237th Report has commented that shortage of staff has a direct bearing on the efficiency of the police. The workload of the existing staff gets increased, resulting in long working hours in stressful and trying circumstances. This not only leads to the increased stress level among the police personnel, but also compromises the overall performance of the police. The DPSC recommended to conduct police recruitment drives in a mission mode and remove the administrative bottlenecks for the recruitment of police personnel at different ranks in a time-bound manner. The States/UTs have been reminded from time to time to fill up the vacant posts in their respective State/UT vide letters dated 09.09.2014, 19.04.2018, 23.10.2019, 04.12.2019 and 13.04.2022.


